"Trinity Bank was Built for Times Like These."

We are pleased to provide this brief monthly update to inform you about your bank's safety and to address the recent confusion in the banking world. We will continue to keep you updated monthly.

<u>Liquidity</u> – As of 3/31/2024, cash at the Federal Reserve Bank and other institutions or "<u>Overnight Money</u>" has increased to \$41,416,000.

In addition, we could sell \$76,314,000 in securities with **NO** reduction in Capital or impact to Net Income.

Therefore, we could create liquidity (to fund deposit withdrawals) of \$117,730,000 with no impact to Capital or Net Income. This would represent over 26% of our total deposits.

<u>Additional Liquidity</u> – We could sell our entire unpledged bond portfolio, at current prices, to generate an additional \$48,578,000 in liquidity.

The sale would generate only a (\$3,206,000) reduction in the bank's Net Income. In this worstcase scenario, **the bank would remain profitable and well above the minimum capital requirements.**

We also have access to \$35,500,000 in the form of three lines of credit we maintain with the Fed as well as two other financial institutions. Currently, we have \$14,706,000 in bonds pledged to the Fed as collateral for our line of credit which has a zero balance.

This would create total liquidity of \$201,808,000 that would represent over 45% of our total deposits.

<u>Capital</u> increased slightly due to the \$646,566 unaudited Net Income the bank produced in March.

Deposits have remained steady at \$442,227,000.
